- More than 800 million people celebrate this festival in various ways.
- It is celebrated in honor of Lakshmi - the Hindu goddess of wealth and prosperity.
- The festival also marks the return of the Lord Rama and Sita after completing fourteen years in exile.
- Diwali is basically another new year but for India
- Rangoli is another thing that people do
- Rangoli is a type of art that people do on stone or rocks.
 Some times they do it on marble or granite
- On Diwali, farmers thank the deities for growing their fruits, vegetables, and wheat
- On Diwali villagers go to temples and pray to Rama, Lakshmi, and Sita

Who Celebrates Diwali?

It is celebrated by multiple different eastern religions including Hindus, Sikhs, Jains, and Buddhists. The festival is celebrated in multiple countries including India, Fiji, Guyana, Pakistan, Malaysia, Mauritius, Myanmar, Nepal, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Suriname, and Trinidad and Tobago. In India, Diwali is celebrated for 5 days, while in other places you only celebrate it for one. Every year the White House actually celebrates Diwali!

Stories Associated with Diwali:

Diwali celebrates both the New Year and the story of King Rama who defeated the evil King Ravana in order to rescue his kidnapped wife, Sita. Another story involves Krishna's victory over the evil king Narakasura to save the people of the his kingdom.

The before Diwali

On the day before diwali night people renovate, clean, and decorate their houses. On Diwali night people dress up in new clothes or their best outfits. During this time people eat sweets from India they either made or bought. They eat indian food and sit and talk with family members.

The day of Diwali

When the celebration starts people light up diyas (lamps) outside their house and light firecrackers and sparklers. Neighbors and family give gifts of foods on Diwali. People celebrate this tradition with family and friends. Many people believe that Diwali began a way to honor the last harvest before winter. During the celebration there are a lot of dances around Diwali such as garba and dandia which are stick dances. Before the eating and dancing first people participate in family puja (prayers).

Garba(gar-baa)- Is a form of dance which was originated in the state of Gujarat in India, It also involves a stick dance

Hindus- A follower of Hinduism

Sikhs- An adherent of Sikhism

Buddhists- Is a religion and dharma that encompasses a variety of traditions, beliefs, and spiritual practices largely based on teachings attributed to the Buddha.
